#### NA History in Richmond, VA

The first Narcotics Anonymous (NA) meeting occurred in either April or May of 1979 in the City of Richmond Virginia. The addicts who formed the area's first NA group received NA approved literature for their initial recovery meeting from another addict traveling through town. The traveling addict's goal was to start an NA recovery meeting in Virginia Beach. This founding group of addicts believed their survival depended on meeting regularly to share with one another about their experience, strength, and hope. Their primary purpose was to stay clean. Thus, the need to start a Narcotics Anonymous recovery meeting became their goal. They named that meeting the "Survivors Group" to reflect its importance. In 1979, the first and oldest meeting in the City of Richmond was formed.

In the early days of the NA fellowship, addicts had to go to Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) meetings if they wanted to do "30 and 30" or a "90 and 90". There were not enough NA meetings to make one each day of the week. However, NA members were a tight group and went to the same AA meetings together. Members identified themselves as "addicts" and sought fellowship together by making the "meeting after the meeting". These addicts recognized how important fellowship with one another was. Old timers recollect that it was usual to go to Aunt Sarah's restaurant after the meeting. "The unity that supports our common welfare is created not only by working together, but also by playing together." *It Works Tradition 1* 

By 1982, there were four NA meetings in Richmond, VA. They were Monday at McGuire Veterans Administration, Wednesday Survivors, Candlelight Friday at VCU parish house, and Sunday night at the Holiday Inn on Franklin Street just past Belvidere Street. Petersburg started the Feelings Group in early 1982.

The second Annual Virginia Convention of Narcotics Anonymous (AVCNA) was in Hampton VA in 1984. Addicts from Richmond, Petersburg, and Chesterfield attended and learned more about the World Service Structure. The local fellowship

started to review the service structure to help promote the NA Traditions, and to carry the message to the addict who still suffered. Service work began to flourish as an important part of our recovery.

The Richmond Area Service Committee of Narcotics Anonymous reformed in 1983 after an initial start in 1982. In December 1983 Tri-Cities formed their Area Service Committee

The Annual Virginia Convention of Narcotics Anonymous (AVCNA) held its third convention in Richmond in 1985, which greatly contributed to a surge of new meetings in the city. By 1985, World Service, with the approval of the fellowship, published the third edition of the Basic Text.

Ten NA groups were carrying the message in the area by the close of 1985. The area's H&I subcommittee delivered NA services to three treatment facilities by 1985. Thirteen NA meetings existed by December 1986.

The fellowship in NA was growing. Addicts began to open meetings in different locations outside of the Richmond City Limits including Southside, Chesterfield, and Petersburg. The New Dominion Area Service formed in May 1996 and Hope Fiends was the first meeting formed under this Area Service.

The three areas came together for a unified Public Relations (PR) Committee in 2009. The unified PR committee collaborated on a single meeting schedule and help line phone commitment. They developed a unified web site address that keeps the fellowship informed about events. This unified subcommittee still functions today to serve our primary purpose.

Another nineteen groups were formed between 1986 and 2000. Since 2000 the message is being carried throughout another seventy-seven meetings. Now, we have 102 groups bringing 142 meetings weekly to the Richmond metropolitan area.

"Our primary purpose should come first; personal recovery depends on NA unity." Tradition One
